SYNOPSIS

ACT I: A hill above the harbor of Nagasaki, Japan; beginning of the 20th Century. U.S. Navy Lieutenant B. F. Pinkerton inspects the house he has leased from the marriage broker, Goro, who has just procured him a geisha wife, the 15-year-old Cio-Cio-San (Madame Butterfly). Pinkerton describes the carefree philosophy of a sailor roaming the world in search of pleasure to Sharpless, the American Consul. He is about to wed Cio-Cio-San with a 999-year marriage contract that contains a monthly renewal option. When Sharpless warns that the girl may not take her vows so lightly, Pinkerton brushes aside such scruples, saying he will one day marry a "real" American wife. Cio-Cio-San is heard in the distance joyously anticipating her wedding. Upon entering, she tells Pinkerton how, when her family fell on hard times, she had to earn her living as a geisha. Her relatives bustle in, expressing their opinions on the marriage. In a quiet moment, Cio-Cio-San shows Pinkerton her few earthly possessions and tells him of her secret conversion to his Christian faith. After the Imperial Commissioner performs the wedding, the celebration is interrupted by Cio-Cio-San's uncle Bonzo, a Buddhist priest, who curses the girl for having renounced her ancestors' religion. Pinkerton angrily sends the guests away. Alone with Cio-Cio-San, he dries her tears, and she declares her love for him.

ACT II: Three years later.

Although Cio-Cio-San and her servant Suzuki are now living in poverty, Cio-Cio-San urges her to have faith, proclaiming that one day her husband's ship will appear on the horizon. Sharpless brings a letter from Pinkerton, but before he can read it, Goro comes with a suitor, the wealthy Prince Yamadori. The girl dismisses Goro and the prince, insisting that her American husband has not deserted her. When they are alone, Sharpless resumes reading the letter and suggests that Pinkerton might not return. Cio-Cio-San shocks Sharpless by introducing him to her child saying that as soon as Pinkerton knows he has a son he will surely come back. If he were not to return she tells Sharpless that she would rather die than go back to her former life as a geisha. After Sharpless departs, the despaired Cio-Cio-San hears a cannon shot. Through a telescope she spots Pinkerton's ship entering the harbor. Delirious with joy, she and Suzuki fill the house with flowers. As night falls, Cio-Cio-San, Suzuki, and her child prepare their vigil, awaiting Pinkerton's return.

As dawn breaks, voices of the arriving sailors are heard in the distance. Humming a lullaby to her child, Cio-Cio-San takes him to another room. Before long, Sharpless enters with Pinkerton and his American wife, Kate. When Suzuki realizes the woman's identity, she collapses in grief but agrees to aid in breaking the news to Cio-Cio-San. Pinkerton, seized with remorse, bids an anguished farewell and rushes off. When Cio-Cio-San enters expecting to find him, she discovers Kate instead. Guessing the truth, the shattered Cio-Cio-San agrees to give up her child if his father will return for him. Then, sending Suzuki away, she takes out the dagger with which her father committed suicide and bows before a statue of Buddha, choosing to die with honor rather than live in disgrace. As Cio-Cio-San raises the blade, Suzuki pushes the child into the room. Sobbing farewell, Cio-Cio-San sends him into the garden to play and takes her own life.

This marks Maestro **BRIAN SALESKY**'s 15th season as Knoxville Opera's Executive and Artistic Director. His administration has been marked by great artistic growth, a tremendous expansion of the company's Education/ Outreach Program, and 14 consecutive years of debt-free, in-the-black operations. His tenure has been highlighted by significant new company repertoire (*La Forza del Destino, The Girl of the Golden West, Manon, Mefistofele, Norma, I Puritani, Maria Stuarda*) a unique three-venue *Tosca*, an on-site *Cavalleria Rusticana* at The Cathedral of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, and the company debuts of many exciting artists including Joyce El-Khoury, Jonathan Burton, Catherine Daniel, Rachele Gilmore,

Donovan Singletary, Noah Stewart, Daniel Sumegi, and Talise Trevigne, who have gone on to international success.

Mr. Salesky has enjoyed a versatile, international career as a conductor of symphonic and chamber orchestras, opera and operetta, ballet and modern dance, Broadway musicals and popular music. During his 50 years in the performing arts, he has also engaged in a wide variety of work as a producer/manager of concerts, opera, television, radio, and videos, and has distinguished himself as an accompanist, music arranger, fund-raiser, educator, lecturer, author, and consultant. Mr. Salesky first won critical plaudits during his six-year tenure as a resident conductor and administrator with the NYC Opera. With the company in NYC and on tour in Los Angeles, Washington, and Mexico, his twenty-five-opera repertoire included the "Live From Lincoln Center" telecast of La Cenerentola. He also served as the director of the NYC Opera National Company, conducting Carmen and La Traviata in 45 cities. The conductor has also appeared with the opera companies of Barcelona, Sydney, Chicago, Cincinnati, Washington, D.C., Atlanta, Dayton, Central City, and Montana. Maestro Salesky has performed with the leading symphony orchestras of Chicago, Madrid, Winnipeg, Peru, Denver, San Diego, Syracuse, the Kennedy Center, Grant Park (Chicago), Napa, South Bend, Greensboro, Utica, and Greeley, and the chamber of orchestras of Los Angeles, Milwaukee, Indianapolis, and Woodstock. In his native NYC, Mr. Salesky has served as Music Director for the Congress of Strings, the Jamaica Symphony Orchestra, the Broadway revival of Man of La Mancha (starring Raúl Juliá) and as Resident Conductor of the Tony Award production of On Your Toes. During his career he has conducted for legendary artists Catherine Malfitano, Renata Scotto, and Alfredo Kraus and has accompanied hundreds of singers including Joan Sutherland, Richard Tucker, Sherrill Milnes, Robert Merrill, and Carlo Bergonzi.

The Indiana University Phi Beta Kappa graduate's range of activities have included positions with the Colorado Symphony, Utica Symphony, American Guild of Musical Artists, Walt Disney Studios, Indiana University, Hunter College, Israel Vocal Arts Institute, and the NYC Performing Arts Education Advisory Commission. From 1996 to 2001 he served as Co-founder, Executive Producer, and fund-raiser for the Raúl Juliá Ending Hunger Fund.





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BRIAN DEEDRICK Stage Director

Knoxville Opera is delighted to welcome back international stage director Brian Deedrick following his very successful Knoxville productions of *Lucia di Lammermoor*, *The Impresario/Gianni Schicchi*, *Die Fledermaus*, *The Elixir of Love*, *Mefistofele*, *The Pirates of Penzance*, *La Bohème*, and *Maria Stuarda*. As a

freelance opera and theatre director, his work takes him all over Canada and the United States, with occasional forays as far afield as Casalmaggiore, Italy and Tel Aviv. During his years as Artistic Director of Edmonton Opera, some of his favorite productions there include *Fidelio*, *Otello*, *Julius Caesar*, *Falstaff*, *Weill in Weimar*, *The Emperor of Atlantis*, *The Abduction from the Seraglio*, and *South Pacific*. Selected freelance opera credits have included *Turandot* and *Aida* for Fort Worth Opera, *Don Giovanni* for Austin Lyric Opera, *Otello* and *La Bohème* for L'Opéra de Québec, *Eugene Onegin* and *Tosca* for Opera Carolina, *The Flying Dutchman* for Baltimore Opera, *L'Elisir d'amore* and *The Pearl Fishers* for Arizona Opera and *The Merry Widow* and *Don Pasquale* in Honolulu. Mr. Deedrick's most recent projects have included *La Bohème* in Winnipeg, Manitoba and *Candide* in Edmonton. Upcoming productions include *Carmen* for Manitoba Opera and *Turandot* for Opera Grand Rapids. When not directing, the Canadian native works as a city tour guide in Berlin, Germany. *"Bob Orth, this one's for you."*

Vocally, you have to sound like a 15-year-old teenager at the beginning. Then, as Butterfly's situation gets increasingly desperate, you can sound more mature going from 15 to 18 years old. Being on stage the entire opera requires great physical strength and the discipline to not project the end of the story while always remaining focused in the moment."





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
